OVERVIEW

The City of Paris Public Works is responsible for the snow and ice removal on 49.3 miles of city-maintained streets. There are some streets, although located in the city, that the KY Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) is responsible for maintaining. (listed on page 14).

The purpose of the Snow Removal Plan is to inform the citizens and our employees of the snow removal process. Our goal is to remove snow and ice from our streets as quickly and efficiently as possible.

The Public Works Department is responsible for purchasing and storing road salt needed for our streets. We consistently house 400 tons of road salt in our salt shed. An average snow event uses 55 tons. However, larger snowfalls can use up to double. We currently order shipments of 100 tons of salt as needed.

There are a variety of conditions that are unique to each event:

- Rate of snowfall,
- The presence of freezing rain or sleet,
- Temperature variations,
- Wind,
- Storm duration,
- Timing of storm.

We consider all these factors in our plan for snow and ice removal to minimize the impact on our citizens.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Public Works is responsible for removing snow and ice from all city streets. We utilize 5 trucks equipped with salt spreaders and plows to fulfill this role. Our employees are each assigned a specific route and are responsible for specific streets (outlined starting on page 9).

We monitor many different weather sources and attend conference calls with the National Weather Service to determine the appropriate action to take.

We also have equipment that is used to keep city-owned parking lots and emergency service parking lots clear of snow and ice. Police, Fire, and EMS are the main priority and receive constant attention to ensure their ability to respond to any emergency that may arise.

In the event that we have to plow streets, driveways will have snow plowed in front of them. This is unavoidable as we cannot clear the street without this issue. While it is not deliberate, we cannot clear all entrances to every driveway after we plow as this would consume all our time. We do apologize for this inconvenience.

When we are called to work, we have a communication flow that is followed. Page 8 details communication within our city during a snow event. The primary goal of all city personnel is the safety of our citizens. Our employees take this responsibility very seriously and are knowledgeable and skilled in completing this assignment.

Typically, it takes 3 hours to salt all the streets. However, that is based on 1 inch or less of snow and temperatures. Higher amounts of snow and lower temperatures will require more time to plow all the streets.

PRIORITIES

During snow and ice events, priority is given to certain streets within our city. These streets are chosen based on emergency services, the location of schools, the location of the hospital, streets with inclines, and high-volume streets.

Normally our winter weather starts with rain and transitions to snow when temperatures fall. We would like to put down a layer of salt before the snow event but if the event starts as rain the salt would wash away. However, if we determine it will start with snow, we will pre-salt our streets to keep the snow and ice from bonding so tightly to our streets.

The timing of a snow event can greatly affect snow and ice removal. Storms that occur during daylight hours will usually take longer to remove due to the higher volume of traffic that is encountered. Should the snow be of a depth that requires plowing we will start with our priority streets and work our way to all streets. Removing all snow and ice is not always possible and various circumstances may alter our efforts. Those include:

- Equipment breakdowns,
- Employee breaks and refueling,
- Refilling salt spreaders,
- Traffic compacting down snow,
- Rate of snowfall.

Our main priority is to focus on public safety first. Police, Fire, EMS, Hospitals, and Schools have a direct impact on public safety and must be maintained to allow our first responders to respond to emergencies.

Priorities continued


Our priorities are to service every street as quickly as possible. Public Works staff have knowledge of their routes and the responsibility to complete their route. We ask our citizens to be patient with our employees as they fulfill their role of snow and ice removal. This task takes time and if your street isn't on the priority list it is still very important to us to get it cleared as soon as possible.

While developing our plan we considered the realistic capabilities of our employees and equipment. During a heavy snowstorm, it will be necessary for our employees to go over priority streets multiple times before getting to other streets. But once passable we will focus on other streets. Our employees work as efficiently as possible to quickly make the streets safe and passable.

CITIZEN TIPS

Winter weather presents challenges that we do not face any other time of year. As part of our plan, we included a list of tips to help our citizens and employees during a snow or ice event.

- Move your vehicle off the street if possible to allow us to clear off street.
- Keep travel to a minimum unless an emergency arises. If a state
 of emergency is declared please stay off the streets. If needed,
 notify 911 and they can arrange emergency procedures to assist
 you.
- Keep snow clear from fire hydrants close to your property.
- Please do not shovel snow back into the street.
- Please do not shovel snow on to catch basins.
- Please allow time for the streets to be treated.
- Please be patient when following snowplows.
- Please do not attempt to pass snow plow trucks
- Remember plow trucks are heavy and cannot stop as quickly as most vehicles. Please do not attempt to pull out in front of them until the truck has passed.
- Please wait until the plows have cleared the street before shoveling driveways. This will prevent you from shoveling the driveway entrance twice.
- Please remember employees take pride in clearing streets and work many long hours to help protect our citizens.







Snow Emergency

What You Need To Know

No Parking on Snow Routes

When the City declares a snow emergency, you **can not** park on Main Street or Martin Luther King Blvd. or any other street the City names. You will get at least 1 hour notice and the city will announce online and through alerts.

Overnight Snow

If snow starts between 11 P.M. and 6 A.M. no and emergency was announced earlier, cars parked can remain until 7 A.M.

- Blocking the Plows
 If your vehicle, trailer, or equipment blocks snow removal, the
 City can tow it, and you must pay all fees.
- •Streets the City Does NOT Plow
 The City does not plow private streets or streets not yet accepted
 by the City. Owners or developers must clear these within **24**hours.
 - Sidewalks

Resident must clear sidewalks within **24 hours** after a snow. If a snow emergency is declared, you get **72 hours**. Don't push snow into the street or block fire hydrants.

- •Driveway Windrows
 The City does **not** clear snow piles left at driveways by plows.
- •Fine
 Parking on a snow emergency route during a prohibition is a **\$100 fine**.
